this is the third meeting of the Central Advisory Board of Education since India attained her Independence. It is now 20 necessary in the light of experience we have gained in the last three years to consider carefully and dispassionately our 40 hopes and plans for the education of free India in the coming years. It was but natural that after the 60 attainment of freedom we should have considered ambitious programmes for the expansion of our national education. This was necessary as 80 education is ..... one of the most important of our nation building activities. 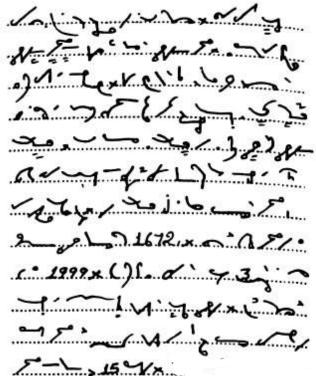
